Texas Leadership Scholars Program

INFORMATIONAL SESSION FOR INSTITUTIONS IN TEXAS

Goals

- The Texas Leadership Scholars program will be a state-wide, premier leadership program aimed at keeping high achieving, low-income Texas graduates in the state to pursue their higher education.
 - Just 15% of top-ten-percent students from Black, Latino, and rural communities go on to enroll in a Texas four-year institution. We are seeking to change this.
- The THECB Texas Leadership Scholars Program will support high-achieving, low-income students in their postsecondary aspirations.
 - The program will connect cohorts of participating students with peer and professional networks and mentors, support leadership development, provide opportunities for undergraduate research, and offer job skills such as resume writing, social media use, communication, and collaboration.

Rollout first cohort Fall 2022.

Eligibility - Students

 Top performing students with demonstrated financial need, leadership in their high school community, and academic success.

- Demonstrated financial need, as evidenced by the completion of FAFSA or TASFA
 - TEXAS Grant eligible
- Graduated from an accredited Texas High School
- Accepted to a participating 4-year institution
- Scholastic record and ability
- Evidence of leadership and service within their high school and community
 - This will be evaluated by the selection committee and may include involvement and leadership in student organizations at school or in the community and service within the community.

Continued eligibility can be defined by the institution.

The Student Experience

A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years:

- Living Learning Community: Scholars will participate in a Scholar-specific Living Learning Community (LLC) for the first 2 years of program.
- Mentoring: Participants in the Scholars program will participate in progressive mentoring throughout their experience on at an institution.
 - Year 1: For the first year of the program, each Scholar will be assigned a peer mentor; the staff liaison will automatically serve as staff mentor and primary contact for Scholars.
 - Year 2: Scholars will be encouraged to transition to the peer-mentor role. Additionally, they will participate in a weeklong job shadowing program during winter or spring break.
 - Year 3: Scholars will attend 2 events a semester to learn and receive advice from corporate and executive leaders regarding what they are looking for in new graduates.
 - Year 4: Scholars will be matched with an alumni mentor who is aligned with their academic/professional goals.

The Student Experience

 A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years continued:

- Undergraduate Research: Scholars will receive access to undergraduate on-campus research experiences. Campus liaisons will ensure workshops are offered related to securing research positions, but also help ensure students receive a research experience while in college by connecting students to opportunities.
- Programming: Campus liaisons will develop a plan to ensure the following programmatic opportunities are offered to students each year.
 - Strengths or Leadership Assessment
 - Group Service Project
 - Networking events to practice communication skills and relationship-building
 - Workshops and earning opportunities on
 - Resume writing
 - Developing your Elevator Speech
 - LinkedIn and other social media branding
 - Value of diversity in teams and businesses
 - Pursuing graduate school

The Student Experience

A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years continued:

- Other Benefits: Outreach to parents to understand the college experience and Scholars program.
- Summer Programming: Students will be selected or apply for the following opportunities. Planning
 and selection will be coordinated by the Scholars Advisory Board (see below for information on the
 Scholars Advisory Board).
 - Leadership Conference: Scholars can participate in an annual leadership conference, hosted by one of the participating institutions.
 - Study Abroad: Scholars can apply to participate in a Scholars-specific paid study abroad experience.
 - Internship Stipends: Scholars can apply for an internship stipend if they pursue a summer internship that is unpaid.

Financial Commitment

Scholars will have 100% of their board-designated tuition and fees covered, through a combination of federal, state, and institutional aid, plus a Room and Board stipend of approximately \$10,000, depending on the institution, annually for 4 years if they continue to meet program requirements.

- The institution will ensure 100% of a student's board-designated tuition and fees are covered.
- The THECB will provide the Room and Board stipend.
- •The THECB will fund summer programming opportunities.

 Given the financial commitment institutions would have to make, participating institutions can cap the number of Scholars they accept per year.

•We are seeking public, 4-year institutions to agree to participate in this program.

•For year 1, institutions must express a desire to participate by June 15, 2022.

• Not participating in year 1, will not preclude you from participating in future years.

Student Application Process – Year 1

Student applies to the Texas Leadership Scholars Program. At the same time, high school principals, counselors, and teachers nominate students and UNT sends nominated students the application.
