## **Presentation Summary:**

Budget: Commissioner Keller has testified before the Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committee on the importance of investing adequately in higher education.

- Both the Senate and House General Appropriations Act have introduced bills in both chambers that include a 5% reduction of the major financial aid programs.
  - THECB's budget proposal for the next biennium include the following two exceptional items:
    - Restoration of the 5% base cut, which is approximately \$57 million dollars across the 3 major financial aid 0 programs – requesting to return budget back to the level set for the current biennium.
      - Requested additional \$110 million funding to maintain funding for the service level for the major financial aid 0 programs for next biennium.

## Policy:

- As it relates to policy aspect of Higher Education, Charles has shared with the committee bills filed by legislators, (e.g., Promise Grant Programs, and new exemption bills). Deadline for filing bills is March 12, 2021; however, it is unclear as to what bills will advance during this session.
- John does not foresee major aroundbreaking Higher Ed. legislation being advanced this session. Health and safety protocols have limited legislators' ability to maintain workflow while having to address COVID19, budget deficient, a re-districting year, and the recent power outages.
- The legislature is also aware of the misalignment issues with the FAFSA Simplification Act (FSA) and the new required e-TASFA implementation.

## Q&A:

- Committee asked if there are ways to assist the legislation to rectify issues surrounding the timing and misalignment challenges facing the FSA and electronic TASFA? Institutions and various leadership should increase awareness of these issues and reach out to legislators about these challenges as it always good for legislators to hear from more than one entity within the higher education industry.
- Committee asked if consideration was given to the loss of income for families when determining the additional \$110 million budget request? Numbers were based on last summer's growth factors for the financial aid programs; however unusual growth due to the pandemic was not factored in; however, budget information provided to the legislature are normally estimates.
- Committee asked how would additional COVID19 relief funds received (CRSSA Act) flow down to universities? Federal funds going directly to institutions have already gone out through the CARES Act – GEER funds. \$175 million went to Coordinating Board to support financial aid programs through CARES ACT GEER funding. The additional GEER funding (CRSSA Act) received by the Governor's office who will determine how those additional funding will be allocated to support primary, secondary, and higher education. Committee was directed to review meeting handouts that contain information regarding the initial GEER funds received and impact of the EEG's (Emergency Educational Grants) as well as demographic information regarding recipients. Feedback received from institutions was tracked by CB on best practices and helpful insights.
