 - o There are challenges with the TSI requirements; it is a barrier with students

Update Summary:

- DeCha Reid provided information on the following:
 - Effective March 1, the agency reduced the interest rate on certain CAL loans from 5.25% to 3.75%. These are loans made between August 2011 and October 2013 and impacts of 6,500 loans. We were able to reduce the interest rate due to the recent interest rate changes. On April 1, THECB will reduce approximately 5,500 loans (reduction of 0.25 5.25% to 5.00% and 450% to 4.25%). All borrowers who were impacted were notified.
 - The following memos were recently released:
 - B.1.10 Strategy Funds Request released on 3/1/2022: This announcement outlined the process to request the additional B.1.10 funds through an online form. Schools must utilize all the original allocation before requesting funds from the B.1.10 strategy. Changes to student count are done through the Grant Payment Portal.
 - A flyer for the Monthly Webcast was released on 3/1/2022 with the topics of discussion. An additional webcast was scheduled on 3/8/2022 at 1:30 p.m. (Central Standard Time).
 - FY2022 FAD Cycle One opened on 2/28/2022. There were some delays in receiving the reports. The issues were resolved and can continue to resubmit the FAD file. Cycle one does not require reconciliation, however, THECB encourages schools to review their data and budget totals to assist with future reconciliation process for cycle three. Schools are encouraged to to submit a FAD file in enough time to work through any errors.

- State Financial Aid Opt-in/out released on 2/22/2022: All institutions are required to complete the Opt-in/Opt-Out form by 3/11/2022 to participate in the state financial aid programs:
 - Educational Aide Exemption (EAE)
 - Texas College Work-Study (TCWS)
 - Work-Study Student Mentorship (WSMP)

Institutions that do not submit an Opt-In/Opt-Out form by the deadline will not be included in the allocation calculation process for the 2023 Fiscal Year.

- Upcoming deadlines
 - o FAAC nominations is due on 3/11/2022
 - State Opt-In/Opt-Out form is due 3/11/2022
 - Good Neighbor nomination forms are due 3/15/2022
- SFAP accomplishments since the last FAAC meeting
 - We were able to generate almost 40,000 IRS 1098—E tax statements for borrows and they were mailed as of 1/31/2022.

 - Less students on campus. Students are virtual and do not need as many loan funds and charges are being covered through grants and scholarships, along with federal funds
 - Students do not want loans and are aware of the debt. Also, students are living at home to cut back on costs.
 - Graduate students stated that the GradPlus process is easier, and CAL seems a little more challenging.














Texas Leadership Scholars Program

INFORMATIONAL SESSION FOR INSTITUTIONS IN TEXAS

Goals

- •The Texas Leadership Scholars program will be a state-wide, premier leadership program aimed at keeping high achieving, low-income Texas graduates in the state to pursue their higher education.
 - Just 15% of top-ten-percent students from Black, Latino, and rural communities go on to enroll in a Texas four-year institution. We are seeking to change this.
- ■The THECB Texas Leadership Scholars Program will support high-achieving, low-income students in their postsecondary aspirations.
 - The program will connect cohorts of participating students with peer and professional networks and mentors, support leadership development, provide opportunities for undergraduate research, and offer job skills such as resume writing, social media use, communication, and collaboration.
- Rollout first cohort Fall 2022.

Eligibility - Students

- •Top performing students with demonstrated financial need, leadership in their high school community, and academic success.
 - Demonstrated financial need, as evidenced by the completion of FAFSA or TASFA
 - TEXAS Grant eligible
 - Graduated from an accredited Texas High School
 - Accepted to a participating 4-year institution
 - Scholastic record and ability
 - Evidence of leadership and service within their high school and community
 - This will be evaluated by the selection committee and may include involvement and leadership in student organizations at school or in the community and service within the community.
- Continued eligibility can be defined by the institution.

The Student Experience

- •A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years:
 - Living Learning Community: Scholars will participate in a Scholar-specific Living Learning Community (LLC) for the first 2 years of program.
 - Mentoring: Participants in the Scholars program will participate in progressive mentoring throughout their experience on at an institution.
 - Year 1: For the first year of the program, each Scholar will be assigned a peer mentor; the staff liaison will automatically serve as staff mentor and primary contact for Scholars.
 - Year 2: Scholars will be encouraged to transition to the peer-mentor role. Additionally, they will participate in a weeklong job shadowing program during winter or spring break.
 - Year 3: Scholars will attend 2 events a semester to learn and receive advice from corporate and executive leaders regarding what they are looking for in new graduates.
 - Year 4: Scholars will be matched with an alumni mentor who is aligned with their academic/professional goals.

The Student Experience

- •A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years continued:
 - Undergraduate Research: Scholars will receive access to undergraduate on-campus research experiences. Campus liaisons will ensure workshops are offered related to securing research positions, but also help ensure students receive a research experience while in college by connecting students to opportunities.
 - Programming: Campus liaisons will develop a plan to ensure the following programmatic opportunities are
 offered to students each year.
 - Strengths or Leadership Assessment
 - Group Service Project
 - Networking events to practice communication skills and relationship-building
 - Workshops and earning opportunities on
 - Resume writing
 - Developing your Elevator Speech
 - LinkedIn and other social media branding
 - Value of diversity in teams and businesses
 - Pursuing graduate school

The Student Experience

- •A designated campus liaison will ensure Scholars experience the following program across 4 years continued:
 - Other Benefits: Outreach to parents to understand the college experience and Scholars program.
 - Summer Programming: Students will be selected or apply for the following opportunities. Planning
 and selection will be coordinated by the Scholars Advisory Board (see below for information on the
 Scholars Advisory Board).
 - Leadership Conference: Scholars can participate in an annual leadership conference, hosted by one of the participating institutions.
 - Study Abroad: Scholars can apply to participate in a Scholars-specific paid study abroad experience.
 - Internship Stipends: Scholars can apply for an internship stipend if they pursue a summer internship that is unpaid.

Financial Commitment

- •Scholars will have 100% of their board-designated tuition and fees covered, through a combination of federal, state, and institutional aid, plus a Room and Board stipend of approximately \$10,000, depending on the institution, annually for 4 years if they continue to meet program requirements.
 - The institution will ensure 100% of a student's board-designated tuition and fees are covered.
 - The THECB will provide the Room and Board stipend.
- ■The THECB will fund summer programming opportunities.
- •Given the financial commitment institutions would have to make, participating institutions can cap the number of Scholars they accept per year.

Institutional Partners

- ■We are seeking public, 4-year institutions to agree to participate in this program.
- ■For year 1, institutions must express a desire to participate by June 15, 2022.
 - Not participating in year 1, will not preclude you from participating in future years.

Student Application Process – Year 1

Student applies to the Texas Leadership Scholars Program.

At the same time, high school principals, counselors, and teachers nominate students and UNT sends nominated students the application.

Selection committee

screens applications and selects students who have shown leadership and service promise in high school.

UNT sends screened Scholars to participating institutions. At the same

time, participating institutions will learn what their allocation of Scholars is (will depend on the number of participating institutions and available

Tentative - July 1

funds).

Participating institution reviews eligibility criteria and selects students:

institution sends acceptance letters to students. Students may receive multiple acceptance letters.

Students commit to one institution by August 1.

Participating institutions report back to UNT who has accepted their offer to attend institution as a Scholar by August 5 so that acceptances can be tracked and we meet recruitment goal. This will also give UNT an idea of financial allocation needed.

Update on Online TASFA

This topic will provide an update on the progress of the online TASFA.

Update:

- Last week there was a monthly webcast on April 20 demoing the online TASFA along with introducing it during the NAOW conference.
 - Making a dedicated TASFA webpage
- Working on the data submission process, in the final stages of the layout; sent it to the TASFA committee and vendors to review; there were no comments made by either group.
 - The goal is to release the file layout in early May to the FA Community.
 - The file type is fixed length at this time but looking for other formats to use in the future
 - Will provide a daily report
 - Plan to send test files in the summer to schools. There are ways to automate the data into a school system.
 - Working on sending data on TASFA to the High School Counselor suite in ApplyTX
 - Testers are the committee members, high school counselors; if more testers are needed, will ask the Data Collection Sub-committee
- Marketing and training is ongoing. Will send plan have more trainings
 - Looking to create modules through the webpage

Virtual Meeting-Leah

- There is a blog post for the high school counselors through TX OnCourse
 - Plan to send out more information to counselors in the summers

Additional reminders:

- The online TAFSA will launch for the 2023-24 academic year and subsequent years.
- The Texas Administrative rules are being updated after the Board Meeting on April 28. The rules will be in 22.6.
- Students needing to fill out a TASFA for the 2022-23 academic year will need to fill out the paper TASFA.
- The online TASFA will only be available in English for the application launch; the Spanish will only be available as a PDF. Other languages will be considered for future releases.
- The online TASFA will not generate an EFC but will transmit the data collected to institution. Corrections can not be done through the online TASFA; there is skip logic but no federal methodology calculation.
 - The application can be sent to multiple schools
 - Completion is done one-time for the student
 - Only in the English version
 - Student and Parent email cannot match
 - No validation of student/parent; institutions can request additional data for verification
 - Electronic signature is a part of the application, no background checks through other databases
- The online TASFA available through the ApplyTexas website is the sole, acceptable online TASFA. All institutions participating in state financial aid programs must accept the data generated by the completion of this online TASFA.
- The TASFA document available through the ApplyTexas website is the sole, acceptable printable version of the TASFA, which institutions may accept from applicants who do not have access to the necessary technology to complete the online TASFA.

- 2022-23 Program guidelines are in progress and the expected date to release is in early May. There are a few rule changes that are up for approval with the THECB Board that have an impact on the release of the guidelines. (Go over the changes)

 - Cosmetic Changes
 - Alnina
- 2022-23 Preliminary Allocations are in their final stages of review and approvals. The goal is to release the 10-day data review in early May. The delay was caused by late FAD certifications. We received the final certification in April.
 - Question to the committee: Are there any thoughts on how to better approach the FAD deadlines?
- Authority to Transfer Process-a memo was released on April 12 informing institutions about the new process to request a transfer of funds. A new form was created to replace sending a request through the Customer Tracking system. The transfer request form must be submitted by July 1, 2022 using the Authority to Transfer form. The Financial Aid Services staff will review the submitted form and send an email notification to the institution to provide next steps for the process.
- TCWS Summer Awarding-Beginning with the 2020-21 award year, institutions that do not utilize their original state work-study allocation during the nine-month academic year are permitted by

- the THECB to use funds for summer awards. All funds must be expended or returned by August 31, 2022.
- outlining the program administration process. We also had a webcast on April 27 where we received some great questions about the program which made us realize that we need to create a Q&A section on our SFAP webpage. We are in the process of reviewing all the questions that were sent in the chat from the webcast to formulate better response. I want to thank all of you who were in attendance yesterday and who posed some great points of consideration for us to review. Given this is the first time the agency has created a centralized program, we are learning more and more each day of the complexities of the administration of the program and appreciate your patience while we navigate this new concept.
