- 400+ Socioeconomic status A and B Sophomore Applicants apply from 70 Public and Private Texas Undergraduate Universities each year

News and Updates

- Added two new medical schools for 2022-2023 Biennium
 - Sam Houston State University College of Osteopathic Medicine
 - University of Houston College of Medicine
- 2021 was highest matriculation into medical school rate in program history
 - 84% of JAMP students successfully achieved the academic and non-academic requirements of the program
- Ben Nguyen, MD, appointed JAMP Council Chair
 - Neurological rehabilitation specialist from UT Southwestern in the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation
 - Special Focus on Outreach and Recruitment with partner undergraduate institutions
 - Focus on continued improvement in retention and program persistence
- JAMP COVID-19 Pandemic Response
 - Virtual Summer Internship implemented
 - Virtual medical school interviews utilized

News and Updates

- 5% Reduction in Funding for 2022 – 2023 biennium.
 - Added medical schools, but not able to increase size of cohort
 - Eliminated support for residency interview stipends
- Focus on program evaluation and assessment
 - Answer key evaluation questions for continuous program improvement
 - i.e., curriculum development, student enrichment opportunities, outreach and recruitment
