ADMINSTRATOR'S STATEMENT

Headquartered in Killeen, TX, Central Texas College is uniquely located in a region that supports the United States' largest military base (Ft. Hood). CTC has provided learning advancement opportunities for diverse students of every age from all walks of life for the last fifty-one years. Central Texas College's service area campuses encompasses more than 10,000 square miles and includes all or part of twelve (12) Texas counties in the Central Texas region, including: Bell, Coryell, Burnet, Lampasas, Hamilton, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Mills, San Saba, Gillespie, and Williamson. In order to effectively serve and provide value to more rural communities, CTC offers educational programs in Brady, Burnet, Gatesville, Hamilton, Lampasas, Marble Falls and San Saba. Central Texas College also delivers education to service members and their families all over the world. In addition to its Central Campus, CTC operates a Ft. Hood Campus, Continental Campus, Europe Campus, Navy Campus, and more than 100 global sites that allow flexible, portable and technologically advanced education service delivery to those who serve in the military. Since the Texas College Credit for Heroes inception, CTC has served as the developer/administrator/evaluator for the program and partners with military and private industry to provide veterans education transition programs that result in quality jobs and careers. CTC also partners with Killeen Independent School District (KISD) to offer Early College High School; and with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) to provide education programs and services to incarcerated individuals, particularly female inmates.

Central Texas College was created to be and remains an affordable (\$95 per semester credit hour including fees) open admissions two-year institution offering a comprehensive array of credit, degree, certificate and lifelong learning programs. CTC credits will articulate to most four-year institutions and CTC has a seamless partnership with upper division Texas A&M--Central Texas, whereby a student can graduate with a bachelor's degree for approximately \$20,000.

CTC also seeks to make sure our education service delivery is accessible. Classes are offered during the day, at night, on weekends and online.

Serving a region with a strong military backbone, fulfillment of the collective community college state funding request for the next biennium will further enable Central Texas College to maximize the education needs of the tens of thousands who serve and have served their families and the civilian families who directly or indirectly support our troops. With additional state support, Central Texas College will make the necessary investments to improve educational outcomes by:

- 1. Growing our military transition education programs and partnerships.
- 2. Expanding Early College High School within and beyond the Killeen Independent School District to the Copperas Cove Independent School District and other districts in our service area.
- 3. Making Dual-Credit programs for high school students more robust.
- Broadening our Weekend and Evening College offerings.
- 5. Improving educational access points for students who are remote and rural.
- 6. Modernizing technology and infrastructure that will provide for a seamless, positive education experience from application to graduation.
- 7. Enhancing campus safely.

Background checks are allowed by Texas Government code, Sec 411.094 and Texas Education Code Section 61.003 (8) on all security-sensitive positions. All CTC positions are considered security sensitive. Background investigations, including but not limited to criminal conviction and driving record reviews, may be conducted on applicants and/or individuals given an offer of employment.

With appropriate state investment in community college education, which happens to be the most affordable postsecondary education option in the state, Central Texas College can continue to be a low-cost, high quality education provider for a special community with unique and diverse postsecondary education needs. 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with our local industry, government, community organizations, K-12, institutions of higher education, and state partners we can help fulfill 60x30TX goals.


Central Texas College respectfully supports the \$1.83 billion formula funding request submitted by the Texas Association of Community Colleges (TACC) in its letter to the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's Office, Budget Division. State support remains critical to the district as it continues to fulfil its statutory role and mission to offer vocational, technical, and academic courses for certification or associate degrees. Together with Texas's other 49 community colleges districts, we will continue to do much of the heavy lifting in the state's efforts to achieve the 60X30TX plan. State support will further be necessary to help address costs related to mitigating the effects of the pandemic, including transitioning to distance education, providing for personal protective equipment, and safely delivering the required in-person instruction essential for students in healthcare and other technical/vocational programs.

In response to the economic downturn resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, Texas community colleges began developing a workforce initiative aimed at providing low or no-cost short-term workforce training leading to high-demand credentials to Texans whose employment and/or academics had been recently disrupted. Central Texas College District respectfully supports the \$50M exceptional item request submitted by TACC in support of this statewide workforce initiative, funded in the amount of \$1MM per college district of the 2022-23 biennium.

Functional Area Descriptions

Chancellor *, Central Texas College (CTC)

The Chancellor attends all sessions of the Board of Trustees and is responsible for the overall operations, management and supervision of activities of the College District. The Chancellor initiates and maintains public relations, marketing and management efforts as well as initiates direction to obtain contracts and grants, to support the educational programs and other activities of the College District. The Chancellor has direct responsibility for the Government and Community Relations office.

Deputy Chancellor, Instruction and Workforce Initiatives *:

The Deputy Chancellor, Instruction and Workforce Initiatives reports to the Chancellor and is responsible for the following areas: Central and Service Area Campuses, Continental and Fort Hood Campuses and Distance Education and Curriculum Development. These areas are charged with providing a comprehensive program of instruction in the university parallel areas to include but not limited to, traditional two year transfer programs, pre-professional programs and programs in the fine and performing arts, science, and the humanities. Comprehensive programs of instruction in the occupational educational and technology areas, including agriculture, distributive education, technical and industrial education, health science, including nursing and allied health, office occupations, public services and associated college credit courses are also provided.

Deputy Chancellor, Finance and Administration *:

The Deputy Chancellor, Finance and Administration reports to the Chancellor and is responsible for the establishment and operation of the Facilities Management Division, the Business Services and Contracting Division, the Human Resource Management Division, the Information Technology Division and the Risk Management Division. The Deputy Chancellor, Finance and Administration also oversees operation of a system of accounting and financial reporting, preparation and control of the institutional budget, control of fixed assets and real property inventories, receipt, custody and disbursement of funds belonging to the institution, investment of funds, issuance and management of bonded debt and campus security and safety. The Deputy Chancellor, Finance and Administration also has responsibility for College Development and Foundation, Europe Campus and Navy Campus.

Deputy Chancellor, Academic and Student Success*:

The Deputy Chancellor, Academic and Student Success reports to the Chancellor and is responsible for ensuring academic excellence in all educational programs wherever they are located or however they are delivered. The Deputy Chancellor, Academic and Student Success is designated Chief Academic Officer to the Texas Higher Education $_{\it A}$

Coordinating Board and is appointed Accreditation Liaison Officer to the Southern Association of colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. The Deputy Chancellor, Academic and Student Success coordinates the institution's reports and activities as required by the Commission on Colleges. The Deputy Chancellor, Academic and Student Success areas of responsibility include the following: Instructional Program Support Services, Student Services, Library Services, Institutional Effectiveness and Student Success and Persistence.
