
Among high school graduates who enrolled in college, approximately 1 in 10 went out of state.³



Among those who enrolled out of state, a lower percentage were economically disadvantaged compared to those enrolling in state.




Hispanics had greater representation among those who enrolled in state whereas African-Americans had greater representation among those who enrolled out of state.




¹ Data presented in this brief came from Coordinating Board Management (CBM) enrollment data, Texas Education Agency high school (HS) graduation and demographic data, and National Student Clearinghouse® (NSC) data. HS graduates who were *not found* in previous THECB reports were tracked out of state using data from the NSC. Students were reclassified from the *not found* category if they enrolled at a 2-year or 4-year institution for at least 12 days in the first fall semester after their HS graduation.

² Percentage is based on total number of HS graduates who enrolled in college divided by the total number of high school graduates minus the not trackable.

³ The Class of 2015 is shown in figures when one cohort year is depicted. General patterns described in this brief also applied to the Class of 2011 through 2014, unless otherwise noted.



Public high school graduates from rural counties were the least likely to leave Texas for college. Four counties (Harris, Collin, Dallas, and Tarrant) accounted for 45 percent of the graduates who left the state for college.



Nearly 1 out of 4 Texas public high school graduates who went out of state for college attended one of eight institutions (shown right).

These nine states account for over half of out-of-state enrollment.
