


2023-24 Online TASFA Updates



2024-25 TASFA Updates

FAFSA Simplification Act impacts on the 2024-25 TASFA:

- Only prioritizing changes on the TASFA that are needed for SAI components
- Paper TASFA form will be released the same time as FAFSA
- Paper draft copy will be shared with institutions prior to the public release
- Development changes are in progress, but the online form will not be available until after FAFSA is released
- Revised file layout will be sent prior to the online release



ALERT: State priority deadline for **2024-25** is now **March 15, 2024**, as a result of these delays.

2024-25 TASFA Changes Overview

- *Removing* approx. 20 questions from the TASFA
- Adding approx. 11 questions from the FAFSA
- *Updating* approx. 13 questions to align with FASFA

- Selective Service Registration Status Question
- Student and Parent Dislocated Worker Questions
- Housing Plan Question

Financial Aid for Swift Transfer (FAST)

FAST Program Overview


Purpose:

The FAST program provides funding to participating public institutions of higher education so they can offer dual credit courses to educationally disadvantaged students at no cost to these students.

FAST Program Eligibility

Eligible students must:

- Enroll in an eligible dual credit course at a public school district or charter school (i.e., eligible for Foundation School Program funding); and
- Take a course offered through an institutional agreement, as outlined in <u>TAC</u>, <u>Section 4.84</u>, from an institution of higher education that has opted to participate in FAST; and
- Qualify for free/reduced-price lunch in any of the four school years prior to the academic year in which they enroll in the dual credit course.





FAST Process Flow

Each semester, an institution will complete two processes related to the FAST program.

#1 - Roster Process

An institution securely uploads a roster file of registered dual credit students via MOVEIT to the THECB to confirm if they were reported as "educationally disadvantaged" to Texas Education Agency (TEA) in the prior four school years.

#2 - Certification Process

The THECB will combine the institution's data with TEA's data to generate a report of eligible student enrollments for FAST funding. The THECB will provide the report to institutions for their review and certification, after which THECB will disburse funding to the institution.


More information will be provided to clarify this certification process.



FAST Program Participation Agreement

The program is **optional** for public institutions of higher education; but Institutions are required to complete a program participation agreement (PPA) to opt-in or out each year.

Texas First Program

NEW! The purpose of the Texas First Program is to allow public high school students demonstrating college readiness to graduate early with the Distinguished Level of Achievement and receive a scholarship, as a state credit, to attend any eligible public institution of higher education (as defined in <u>TEC</u>, <u>Section 61.003</u>). This program includes two major components: *1. Early High School Completion*; and *2. Scholarship*.

The Texas First Program Scholarship is authorized by <u>TEC, Title 3, Chapter 56, Subchapter K-1, Section 56.221</u>. Rules for administering the scholarship can be found in <u>TAC, Title 19, Chapter 22, Subchapter T</u>. Texas First Program FACT SHEET

Texas Higher Education

rogram Authority and Purpose:

The purpose of this program (in conjunction with the <u>Texas First Program Diploma</u>) is to promote efficiency in the state public education system and encourage the enrollment of high performing students at Texas public research and emerging research institutions of higher education (see Texas Administrative Code, Title 9, Part 1, Londer 2, 25, Wichander T).

Eliaible Institutions

All Texas public institutions of higher education, defined in <u>TEC, Title 3, Section 61.003</u>, are required to apply the state credit offered to an eligible, enrolled student through this program.

Program Eligibility

To receive a scholarship, as a state credit, a student must:

- · be enrolled at an eligible institution;
- be a resident of Texas;
- · be registered for Selective Service, or be exempt; and
- · have graduated early from high school under the Texas First Program with the Distinguished Level of Achievement.

Discontinuation of Eligibili

A state credit awarded to an eligible student expires at the end of the first academic year following the student's graduation from high school. If any portion of a state credit is unused, the remaining amount may be applied to subsequent semesters ONLY if it is within the first academic year following the student's graduation from high school.

Scholarship Certificate:

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) will issue a certificate to eligible students indicating the amount of state credit a student has available if errolled at an eligible public institution. To receive a certificate, the student's high school counselor (or administrator) must verify that the student has met all eligibility requirements for the Texas First Program Dictional and its Distinguished Level of Achievement.

Award Amounts:

The amount of state credit offered to the student is contingent on the number of semesters the student graduates early and the maximum annual (two semester) Toward Excellence, Access, and Success (TEXAS) Grant award amount for the applicable academic year, which is determined by the THECG (see <u>1AC</u>, Title 19, Part 1, Section 22.555).

Upon enrollment of an eligible Texas First Early High School graduate, the institution must apply a state credit to the student's charges that is equal to the lesser of:

- . the amount of the state credit available to the student; or
- . the student's actual tuition, mandatory fees, and other costs of attendance at the institution

Note: The amount of state credit offered to a student may NOTbe considered in the calculation of any state or institutional need-based aid awards or the calculation of the student's overall financial need, unless the combination of the critical and other federal, state, and institutional financial aid (excluding work-study and loan programs) exceeds the student's estimated total cost of attendance (COA).

Institutional Rosters

Program rosters containing a list of students who have been issued a scholarship certificate can be accessed via the institution's Grant. Output fold with the control to t

Processing Funds:

The THECB will reimburse each eligible institution the amount of state credit applied to an eligible student's account during the preceding academic year. The institution's annual Financial Aid batabase (FAD) submission will be used to calculate the reimbursement amount (see TAC, Title 19, Part 1, Section 22.556).

Texas First Program Overview

The Texas First Program is designed to keep Texas' best and brightest on a direct track to postsecondary education here in our great state.

Note: Effective **September 1, 2023**, the number of institutions of higher education that are eligible to award the Texas First Scholarship to eligible Texas First Diploma graduates expands from ten institutions to <u>all</u> Texas Public Institutions of Higher Education, including colleges, universities, and technical colleges.

ALL public institutions of higher education are required to participate in the program.

Texas First Program Components

Diploma

Enables eligible students to graduate early with the Distinguished Level of Achievement and receive a Texas First Scholarship.

Scholarship

Enables eligible students to receive a scholarship for one or two semesters at an eligible institution of higher education.

Scholarship Eligibility

To be eligible a student **must**:

- be enrolled at an eligible institution;
- be a resident of Texas;
- be registered for Selective Service, or be exempt; and
- have graduated early from high school with a Texas First Program Diploma (also referred to as the Texas First Early High School Completion Program).





State Credit

Upon enrollment of an eligible Texas First Early High School graduate, the institution must apply a state credit to the student's charges that is equal to the lesser of:

- the amount of the state credit available to the student; or
- the student's actual tuition, mandatory fees, and other costs of attendance at the institution.

Note: The amount of state credit offered to a student may NOT be considered in the calculation of any state or institutional need-based aid awards or the calculation of the student's overall financial need, unless the combination of the credit and other federal, state, and institutional financial aid (excluding work-study and loan programs) exceeds the student's estimated total cost of attendance (COA).



State Credit

Maximum State Credit Amount: TEXAS Grant maximum award

Example:

Award year: 2023-24

State Credit available: \$5,887

Student's Tuition and Fees, and other COA: \$4,500

The amount of state credit the school will apply to the student's charges is \$4,500 because it is the <u>lesser</u> of the maximum amount of state credit available to the student.



Texas First Scholarship Institution Process Flow

Confirmation of Eligibility

HS administrator verifies student meets eligibility requirements to graduate early with a Texas First Program Diploma and send a confirmation form to THECB.

Scholarship Certificate

THECB will issue a certificate to eligible students and provide recipient rosters to institutions.

Roster Retrieval

School retrieves (download) rosters through the MOVEIT DMZ portal in the Grant_Output folder.

Apply State Credit

Institutions applies state credit to the student's charges.


Request Reimbursement

Institution reports state credit on annual Financial Aid Database submission to calculate the reimbursement amount.



Recipient Rosters

- Recipient rosters includes a list of **all** eligible students who have been issued a certificate.
- Roster updates occur when new certificates are issued.
- Institutions are not required to collect scholarship certificates issued by THECB to the student.






GAPP Landing Page




To initiate the payment request process, click **Payment Request**.

Complete the Payment Request form by filling in the following information:


- Select the program. The fiscal year and remaining allocation amount will auto populate






GAPP Help Desk Ticket
